WHAT WILL YOUR HOBBY BE IF HARE 11 is passed????

Have you ever hunted rocks in South Dakota? This state has more acres of public land for rock hunting than any other Midwest State. Some prime areas, Red Shirt, a section of the Cheyenne River, and Indian Creek will be closed to vehicles and be absorbed in the gigantic and nationwide new Wilderness system, if Congress passes it. Millions of acres in many states may be withdrawn.

The emvironmental impact study on RARE 11 will by out in May. Watth for it. This could affect many of our prime free rock hunting areas on the Midwest and West.

The public will have several months to react to the program as recommended in the study. Every collector is urged to help give the point of view of our hobby. Write to the U.S. FOREST SERVICE and to your nearest Borest Service office. (Regional headquarters for the threatened land in South Dakota is Denver.) But also write to your congressment!

letters should be written in your own words as individuals. Don't be emotional. Give a straight facts, plainly stated. For example, rock hunting may be a family recreation for you, and roads may be necessary for you to reach your favorite areas, as your family may have someone too old, or too young, or too handicapped, to reach the spots otherwise. Or you could be making a scientific collection of fluorescent rocks and have a dark room installed in your van. Or your time may be so limited that you would be spending all of your time walking to the location, if there were no roads. Whatever your reasons, state them plainly and simply and let people know your opinion, and what you think should be done.

Most of the lands in RARE 11 should be multiple use. Remem er to state that we are collecting for educational purposes. We support the earth sciences and the lapidary arts. We are not destructive. We are not killing wild life or destroying scenery. Our hobby is good for us and good for the country!

For a copy of the environmental impact statement (due out in May) and Material about HARE 11, white the Denver Forest Service Office, 11177 W. 8th Ave., Lakewood, Colo. 80225. Ask to be on the mailing list.

Lots of letters will help. We may also need phone calls, telegrams, and personal visits to congressmen. This may be the summer we will each have to stand up and be counted for the future of our hobby.

- I will use no firearms or blasting material in collecting areas.
- I will cause no wilful damage to property of any kind-fences, signs, buildings, etc.
- I will leave all gates as found.
- I will build fires in designated or safe places only and will be certain they are completely extinguished before I leave the area.
- I will discard no burning material matches, cigarettes, etc.
- I will fill all excavation holes which may be dangerous to livestock.
- I will not contaminate wells, creeks, or other water supply.
- I will cause no wilful damage to collecting material and will take home only what I can reasonably use.
- I will support the rockhound project H.E.L.P. (Help Eliminate Litter Please) and will leave all collecting areas devoid of litter, regardless of how found.

I will cooperate with field trip leaders and those in designated authority in all collecting areas.

- I will report to my club or federation officers, Bureau of Land Management, or other proper authorities, any deposit of petrified wood or other material on public lands which should be protected for the enjoyment of future generations for public educational and scientific purposes.
- I will appreciate and protect our heritage of natural resources.
- I will observe the "Golden Rule", will use "Good Outdoor Manners" and will at all times conduct myself in a manner which will add to the stature and "public image" of rockhounds everywhere.

TULLIMONSTRUM gregarium (Tully Monster) By Richard Rock From ILLOWA NEWS Grinder.. April 1978

The "tully monster" was first brought to the Field Museum of Natural History, in Chicago, in 1958, by Mr. Francis Tully, then of Lockport. Since then, many thousands of specimens have been found by fossil collectors. The monster is only found in Illinois, at Pit 11, Morris, and Astoria. The Tully Monster has not been assigned a Phylum, because it dose not fit into any known Phylum. They are found in the concretions of the Carbondale Formation. This strange animal existed during the Pennsylvania Period, some 280 million years ago.

Russell MacFall and Jay Wollin, in their book, "Fossils for Amateurs," described the Tully Monster as, "The creature, if it is a creature, had as elongated, cigar-shaped body divided into segments. At one end was a spade-like tail and on the other a slender snout ending into a toothed claw. Behind the fanout a bar terminated by two small tumps crossed the body. The strange creature was about five inches long."

Mr. Francis Tuliy found his monster in the 1ste 1950's. The strip mine area of Pit 11 has abundant fossils to be found. Mr. Tully has an outstanding collection, but it has taken him many years of repeated trips into the stripmines of Illinois.

The Morris area is located one mile wast, on Route 6. The Astoria area is located North of Astoria about three miles, on Pearl Street. This area has been leveled and planted in grain. The Pit 11 location is south of Braidwood on Route 53, about three miles.

So GET OUT AND COLLECTIVITY

EQUATOR MAY ONCE HAVE CUT ACROSS AMERICAN MIDWEST

Evidence is being found in our Midwestern Coal fields that three hundred million years ago the earth's equator cut across what is now the American Midwest, and that part of this country and parts of Europe and the Soviet Union probably belonged to the same continent.

The evidence is found in coal balls (petrified peat) which contains fossil remains of plants which failed to carbonate and become coal.

Br. Tom Phillips and his graduate students in paleobstany at the Unuvirsity of Illinois are studying coal balls to determine plant life of the period. They have found that remains of plants in the petrified peat resemble plants found today in the tropics; evidence that the earth's equator was once ina different position. They found several hundred species of plants including tree ferns and club mosses, which have the same characteristics as their modern tropical descendants.

"Stacked up in coal is the history of what was going on in the swamp," Phillips said. He said that he can study Russian plants here by going to southern Illinois. This uniformity further substantiates the theory of continental drift. A coal seam from what is called the Pennsylvanian period extends on an arc from Oklahoma eastward and would connect with the continuation across the Atlantic if the continents were shoved to-

Coal balls with the same material have been found in the Donetz Basin in the Soviet Union and also in Great Britain, Germany, Belgium and the Netherlands.
