



SECRETARY'S REPORT - MAY MEETING

The Cedar Valley Rocks and Minerals Society met May 16, 1979 at 7:30 p.m. in the REC Building in Marion. There were thirty-two members and three guests in attendance with Vice-President Roger Dabler presiding.

B Vice President Dabler introduced guest speaker Ray Anderson of the Iowa Goological Survey. Mr. Anderson gave a slide-lecture presentation on the Geological History of Iowa, which included excerpts of the book, "Iowa Landforms." This was a very interesting and informative program that covered the formation of rocks & minerals in Iowa from the beginning of the Earth to present day, and the uses of the rocks by man.

The minutes of the April regular meeting were read by Secretary Pro Tem LaVonne Grove. Leslie Hin asked that the minutes be emended to read Leslie Hin moved that we order seven copies of the AFMS Book Lapidary Materials" instead of AFMS Resource Book as was stated. Dr. Hoppin thanked the Society members for the Awards and stated that the students will contact the Society later and make arrangements to meet with the Society, and because of

Roger Dabler announced that there will be a program given on Genology by Professor Garvin of Cornell in the fall.

Marian Peters reed letters from: the Old Capitol Geological Club thanking the Society for the gift of \$300.00; and from Mr. Fred Marek and Mr. Ed Wilder for the checks they received for their expenses at our Show.

Marian Peters read a letter from AFMS Scholarship Chairman Katherine Steinbrenner congratulating the Society for their 1000% participation in the AFMS Scholarship fund, and presented the plaque we received for the achievement.

Lavonne Grove read a letter from MMF Secretary Jean Reynolds, stating a proposed change in the MMF By-laws. This change would give the MMF Executive Committee the right to replace MMF Permanent Committee Chairmen who were not performing their duties. Mrs. Reynolds enclosed a form for us to fill out to register our delegate for the 1979 MMF Convention.

Mr. Dabler asked if anyone is going to the Convention. No answer. Mr. Dabler "(Minutes of the April Executive Board Meeting were het available).

Mr. Gilbert Jurgeneyer, a guest from Keystone, asked if any member of our Society would be willing to give lapidary demonstrations during the Keystone Centennial Celebration, the 2nd week in June, 1984. Mr. Dabler said that probably several members would work in shifts for this event.

Leslie Rlin read an item from an exchange Bulletin stating that the Northeast Iowa Clubs are going to present a bid for the 1989 MAF Show with the assistance

of Lyle Waterman and Norman Brown.

Lumir Dlask said that he has room in his van for another man to accompany him

on the S. Dakota field trip being planned. Anyone interested may contact him.

Leslie Blin stated that the Show meeting immediately following the April 25th Board Meeting a vote was taken to decide whether our Glub would hold a Show in 1980. Mrs. Hin stated that since the members were not told that a vote would be

taken at that meeting, that the results of that vote was illegal.

Gladys Zobac stated that a notice in the March Newsletter stated that a vote would be taken at the March regular meeting, and that it was not taken at that time. Members were told at that meeting that a show "re-hash" meeting would be held after the April Board meeting, but not that a vote would be taken for the 1980 Show, and Mrs. Zobac further stated that the vote taken at the Board meeting

counted two absentee ballots which is also illegal.

Mr. Dabler said we must make a decision soon on whether we will hold a Show so that arrangements may be made to rent Hawkeye Downs. Mrs. Elin suggested that first it should be determined if members will work on the show. Mr. Dabler asked for a show of hands on how many members were willing to work. Twenty members so indicated. Mel Abernathy suggested that we rent only one building and that the programs be held in the same building as the rest of the Show. Alberta Gray suggested that the Show plans be printed in the Newsletter much earlier next year so that members would have some idea of what those plans are.

Bill Myers suggested that in the future we have some real Show meetings and

enough notice be given so that members can attend those meetings.

Mr. Dabler said he would pass those suggestions on to the 1979 Show Chairman. Skinny Lutz moved that we hold a Show in 1980. Helen Lutz seconded the motion. Mr. Dabler asked for a show of hands for or against. Twenty members voted yes, five members voted no. Motion carried.

Mr. Dabler said that a Show meeting will be held in September to plan the Show. Bud Cray moved for adjournment. Skipny Lutz seconded the notion. Carried.

Are we an EDUCATIONAL Club????? by Marian Peters Some of our Club members have voted to have another Show in 1980 -- It is becoming more and more apparent that many of our club members are asing the Club for personal gains. With more and more dealers in the club th there are fewer people to man the tasks of hosting an educational Show. Some of our members are becoming to old to be taxed for a 16 hour lay and others are in poor health and unable to help.

Since some dealers are so anxious to have a Show each year, why can't we all be dealers? All it takes to become a dealer is to apply for a sales permit, which costs about a \$1.00, think up a catchy name, print up a few business cards and stationary and began to order from some who esaleers. You might have to spend an evening ob two a week to make up a few saleable items, but mever-the-less you're in business. Oh, yes, you must be a dealer in "good standing". I don't really understand this catche phrase, but it must mean that you have no derogatories. So what do you say, lets all be dealers at our next Show? We'll man the tasks when we're not busy with our personal gains.

Of course this may present another little problem. Our Club is a taxexempt organization under regulations 501.3.... No where in those regulations do I find that we can use the club for personal gains! We are tax exempt for educational purposes. I have a copy of the regulations as well as do several others members. I called the IRS office in Des Moines to confirm my opinion of Sec. 501.3(e). I want you to read it.

(e) Organizations carrying on trade or business -(1) In general. An organization may meet the requirements of section 501(c)(3) although it operates a trade or business as a substantial part of its activities, if the operation of such trade or business is in furtherance of the organization's exempt prupose or purposes and if the organization is not organized or operated for the primary purpose of carrying on as unrelated brade or business, as defined in section 513. In determing the existance of such primary purpose, all the circumstances must be considered, including the size and extent of the trade or business and the size and extent of the activities which are in furtherance of one or more exempt purposes. An organization which is organized and operated for the primary purpose of carrying on an unrelated trade or business is not exempt under section 501(c)(3) even though it has cestain religious purposes, its property is held in common, and its profits do not inure to the benefit of individual members of the organization.

Lets use the club for the purpose that it was established. We are an EDUCATIONAL Club, it seems somewhere along the way we forgot about that.

ATTENTION ALL MEMBERS! : The REC called with a complaint that a table had not been put away after the last meeting. This is the first compliant I've recleved or can remember we ever have got, but we must see that it doesn't happen again. Do you realize that we get the use of the room RENT FREE? We must see that it is left in proper order after our meetings, all tables put away and chairs too. And the floor swept. Starting in Sept. we will be calling the people who bring cookies "hosts" It will be their responsibility to come early & set up, make drinks, stay & clean up after the meeting, put chairs tables away & sweep the floor & lock up. CEDAR VALLEY GEMS

FLINT - OHIO'S OFFICIAL GEM STONE

In 1965, when the 106th General Assembly designated an offical gem stone for Ohio, they chose flint, a rock that has been of long and baluable service to man. Flint is a form of silica(SiO2) and id there fore an enduring material. As a result, many of the flint tools and weapons of early man have survived from prehistoric times. They serve as a record of his life and habits and tell us much of what we know about his growing civilization.

Flint in some forms is also a prized semi-precious gem stone, probably the one most representative of Ohio and a particularly appropriate symbol

The most outstanding occurence of flint in Ohio is at Flint Ridge, which extends from east of Newark almost to Zanesville in Southeastern Licking County and the adjacent area of Muskingum County. Here may be found striking examples of flint in a wide variety of colors: red, green, blue yellow, white, and black, and many combinations of these shades. These rocks are valued highly by the collector and, when shaped and polished, make exceptionally beautiful pieces of jewelry. There are mumerous other occurrences of flint in Ohio where the mineral is generally white or black, but still attractive when polished.

FROM THE AFMS NEWSLETTER MAY 1979

Tennessee now has LIMESTONE as official State rock as signed into law by Governor Lamar Alexander March 13th. Limestone resulted from a two year lobbying effort by sixth grade students at Martin Junior High in Morthwest Tennessee. Traditional backers of laws received the pens which the bill is signed. Reported: "Miss Genny", Governor Alexander asked how many students in your class?" "157", she replied. Governor Alexander whistled quietly, asking if three pens would do. Mre. Vaughn said we'll frame them". The students presented the Governor a mounted "chunk" of limestone which he is using on his desk. (Chattanooga News-Free Press)

SHOWS: THEY RE BIG BUSINESS

There are 1300 shows a year. The big show months are October and April. Several dealers groups also sponsor wholesale trade shows in many cities. There are about 200 of these in a year. Numberous trade shows coincide with big shows like Tucson and Detroit.

Shows range from modest free shows, planned by a club for its members and friends and neighblrs, to big nationally known highly publicized shows. Some shows are purely educational. Some are purely commercial. Some specialize in minerals, or lapidary, and some are even more exclusive like the Faceters Fair, the Opal Show, or the American Fossil Show,

Attendance can be from 1000 to 40,000. This probably averages out to about 3500 per show. So there could be over 4 million people a year attending our shows, are we using this poportunity well? Are we educating them? And how about us? Are we participating fully in our shows? Age we learning from them? Are we attending the Federatoon Shows as we should?

POLISHING TIP OR WARNING - from ACHATES, via TEMPLATE

A word of warning for those who use diamond powder embedded in canvas discs for polishing. Since some craftsman run these discs dry, and the person working on such a disc usually stands directly over the unit, quite a bit of the flying dust will be inhaled. This can lead to afirst class case of a condition like silicosis. Many cheap but effective dust masks are available at safety supply stores and they will cut dust inhalation. After using one of these masks, take a look at the filter you'll be amazed at what you could have inhaled!

REGARDING RUTLLATED QUARTZ - from the GEODE, via BACK BENDERS QAZETTE

Be careful when grinding rutilated quartz/ The acicular needles or rutlle may not be as firmly locked in the silica as you might think. When silica gel solidifies, it shrinks and can draw away from inclusions. In grinding, the needles can dislodge and puncture your fingers.

To get a gloss finish on tiger eye, polish once, dry the stone, then put a drop of vinegar on it. Leave a couple of minutes and then give it a second polish, Result should be the deep gloss finish you want. from PICK & CHISEL , via theSTONE TABLET


The Kemps are widely traveled, and have attended many regional and AFMS shows. They have also been show committee officers of shows in the Chicago area.

Mineral guides for the collector continue to come to our attention. Among them is A FIELD GUIDE TO TOPAZ AND ASSOCIATED MINERALS OF TOPAZ MOUNTAIN, UTAH, by John Holfert, in a revised edition. Holfert, whom we met at the Tucson, Ariz., show, lives in Bountiful, Utah, and had some of his prize specimens along at the show. Topaz Mountain has long been a mecca for collectors interested in digging from its rhyolite cliffs, the topaz, bix byite, red beryl, pseudobrookite, garnets and other minerals found in vugs there. Holfert describes the precise locations he has found rewarding, illustrating them with hand-drawn maps and 36 excellent illustrations as well as crystals drawings and descriptions. The booklet of 66 pages is copyrighted 1978. The The price is \$5.95.

Mineral and Gem Localities in Arizona by Lee Hammons is published by Arizona Maps and Books, P. O. Box 1133, S Sedon, Ariz. After a preliminary discussion of identifying, cleaning and discovering minerals, Hammons presents a set of guide maps and then 30 maps in color which identify by color the major rock types in each area as well as more precise mineral localities by circles and crossed lines within them which express degree and precision of the location. Some locations are identified with a single mineral, others with general families of minerals or metals. Hammons' guide is loose leaf with a decorated stiff cover. It is copyrighted 1977 and has 112 pages.

Readers of the Newsletter who know of other mineral or fossil locality guides that have not been described in this series of reviews are urged to let the reviewer know about them.
