Program Chair Bill Desmarais reports the program will be: "Earth is Rock: Showcasing the VAST Center Middle School Earth History Unit," presented

by Gina Rutenbeck (College CSD 7th Grade Science Educator) and Erica D. Larson (GWAEA VAST Consultant).

Erica and Gina will introduce you to the VAST Center's Earth History Unit by featuring elements of an investigation titled: Earth is Rock. In this investigation you will gain an overall perspective of the Grand Canyon using a Flyover Video created in Google Earth; then proceed to learn about Powell's River Trip emulating his observation techniques using images and rock samples from Mile 20 and Mile 52. You then will use your observations of the properties of the rock samples to correlate the rock columns from each location as geologists do when recreating the story of the history of the formation of the layers of rock exposed in the Grand Canyon. FALL AUCTION SEPTEMBER 17-18 Your Help is Needed!



Are you ready for two big days of auctioning rocks, minerals, fossils, and machinery on September 17th & 18th at Amana RV Park Morton Building? The build-

ing is at the corner of Central & 7th St. in the park. This promises to be a good — and probably long — auction. See the auction flyer at the back of the newsletter for details, and check our website for pictures of some of the material for sale.

We all like to *ooh* and *aah* over specimens and hopefully end up with some choice ones, but before the auction takes place, much help is needed to move the material and get it sorted and arranged into lots and get numbers on the lots during Friday's setup. During the auction itself, help is needed to run auction sheets, spot for the auctioneers, move lots to the front of the hall, and finally to tear down. Please help if you can!

Friday, September 16, Setup: Meet at Amana RV Park at 8:30 a.m. to unpack boxes and arrange material into lots. Bring flats, gloves and your energy. It is extremely important to keep each person's material together. Because we are dealing with a large number of consignees, it is extremely important to be very careful not to move material away from its assigned area, especially equipment!

If you don't know what to do, just start working with somebody who looks like they know what they're doing. If you are unsure about how to make lots, just use your best judgment to get started. It is tremendously helpful to have all the material laid out in approximate lots, even if they have to be refined later. Darren Cruse, Jeff Groff, Marv Houg, Dale Stout, and others who are experienced judges of lots will look over all the lots and rearrange them if necessary. Lots of like material will be arranged so that some will sell each day. When all lots are properly arranged, a number will be put on each one. All this has to be done by 5:00 for viewing.

Some members are needed during viewing until 7:30, so if you have time off on the 16th, your help will be greatly appreciated.

<u>Set-Up Day Meals</u>: The club will furnish lunch at noon - Dell James always has great food planned. There will also be rolls and coffee/pop in the morning We will order pizza for supper during viewing.

FIELD TRIP TO KLEIN QUARRY—OCT 9



A joint field trip with MAPS to Klein Quarry, Coralville, has been scheduled for Sunday, October 9. Meet at the main entrance to Klein at 8:45 to sign in and get safety instructions. Enter the quarry at 9:00. This is a lock-in quarry; that is, the gate is locked behind us, and no one can enter or leave (except in an emergency) until 12:15, when a group will be let out. Others can come in at that time if they are waiting at the gate. The rest of the group will leave at about 4:00.

This is a "hard-rock" working quarry. Participants must have their Personal Protective Equipment, I.e. a Hard Hat, Sturdy Shoes and Safety Glasses & Safety Vest. Adults are responsible for their minor children at all times! Stay Away From The High Walls at the Bottom and at the top - this will be Strictly Enforced! Please Note: If you come with jelly shoes, sandals, etc. - you Will NOT go in - Closed Toe Sturdy Footwear is REQUIRED!

Possible finds include: coral heads, horn corals, brachiopods, bryozoans, trilobites, crinoids and maybe cephalopods, fish parts, and blastoids; millerite, calcite, pyrite, sphalerite. Useful tools include: rock hammers, cold chisels, sledges and pry bars. Bring your own water and lunch.

To save time, download and fill out the club liability waiver at www.cedarvalleyrockclub.org (all lower case).

Directions: From I-80, take Exit #240 (Coral Ridge Ave.), go south to Hwy 6 (at the T intersection & light), go right .4 mile to Deer Creek Rd., go left .6 mile on Deer Creek to the quarry entrance on the right. Check our website for a map and safety rules—www.cedarvalleyrockclub.org.

Earth Science Week Kicks Off with International EarthCache Day

Alexandria, VA – Earth Science Week 2011 will kick-off with the fifth annual International EarthCache Day on Sunday, October 9th. The public is invited to join the Geological Society of America (GSA), organizer of the global EarthCache program, and the American Geological Institute (AGI), Earth Science Week coordinators, in exploring this exciting and educational earth science experience.

International EarthCache Day is a time when Earth-Cachers around the globe organize small gatherings where people can learn something about the Earth. An EarthCache is a place that people locate with a GPS device while participating in a "treasure hunt" called geocaching.

"The treasure you find at an EarthCache is a lesson about the Earth itself," says EarthCaching Program Director Gary Lewis of GSA, a longtime Earth Science Week partner. "Each EarthCache site will teach you something about the science of our dynamic planet - you actually have to do a task to prove that you have been observing and learning from your EarthCache visit."

EarthCache events are being held around the world this October 9th. To view the locations for EarthCaching events, go to http://www.earthcache.org. (141 sites are listed in lowa—Editor)

In 2004 Lewis developed the world's first EarthCache on an Australian headland, which features geologic evidence of an ancient ice age. Since that time, more than 11,200 EarthCaches have been established by geocachers around the globe, and some 1,250,000 people have visited the sites. More EarthCaches are added daily.

COLLECTING KEOKUK GEODES

While cracking geodes with my daughter at the club's Demonstration Night in March, many members asked where to go to find geodes. If I responded somewhat cryptically, I apologize—there are numerous places to go, but it's difficult to explain without taking the time to write down phone numbers, addresses, directions, etc. I thought I would put my thoughts and recommendations down in writing for anyone that may be interested in searching for the famous Keokuk

Why the fascination? For me, it started as a child when I was given a very hollow quartz crystal-lined geode. It was beautiful, but never did I dream of finding one myself. It was not until a few years ago, after becoming acquainted with people on an online rock and mineral collecting forum, that I learned that not only could I find a geode, but also that they were even plentiful—if you knew where to



look. To suggest I was "giddy" when I went out on my first geode hunt is a bit of an understatement. Despite having gone on dozens of expeditions, collecting thousands of geodes and appearing in *Rock and Gem* magazine, I am not an expert—I just know where to find them.

Where can they be found? It is written that Keokuk geodes can be found within a 35 to 70 mile radius of Keokuk, Iowa, a town located on the Mississippi River in the very southeast corner of the state. This area is referred to as the Tri-state area. with Illinois just across the Mississippi River to the east and Missouri on the other side of the Des Moines River to the south. While I have found geodes in all three states, some of the best geode locations are found in Hamilton, Illinois, just across the Mississippi River from Keokuk. The "Keokuk" name of the geode is a bit of a misnomer since a person will not likely find a geode within the Keokuk city limits unless he or she happens upon the wonderful Bevard collection on display at the Keokuk Holiday Inn Express on Main Street!

How do they form? Apparently, this question cannot be answered with any certainty—geologists do not agree nor is there a universally held theory on the forces that caused the creation of the geode, aside from its being a sedimentary process, as opposed to the volcanic forces that formed thundereggs. According to most geological references, a

geode is defined to be hollow, but in my experience, the solid varieties are much more abundant. Technically speaking, if it's solid, it is a "nodule." Call me a rebel, but I refer to the solid ones as geodes, too.

So where are they, specifically? Keokuk Geodes can be found weathering out of hillsides, creeks and river banks from the lower Warsaw

Formation. Sometimes they are in soft soils close to the surface, but often they are embedded in the harder shale-like layers many feet below the surface. While they can be found in creeks and rivers, I avoid searching in these areas unless I have the express permission of the adjacent property owners. One might argue that the navigable waterways are public—which they may be—but when a property owner wields a shotgun, it wouldn't seem smart to argue one's right to be there. So I stick to designated private property "mines," such as the following:

Fire Agate Author Unknown

From Geode, May 1972

Ed. Note: There will be lots of fire agate at our auction September 17-18

Fire agate is a chalcedony that has been deposited in layers. The fire comes from a thin coating of limonite deposited between the layers at the time of formation. Usually there is a large amount of matrix on the specimen, so soak it in water for at least ten minutes. This will help to determine which area of fire you want to bring out.



A stone can be ruined at this point. If it is ground too far and into the limonite layer, the fire can be lost. Dop

stick. Using 220 grit, work the top por-

tion of the agate toward a high crown.

As you grind down the top and sides,

Choose a portion that has a solid layer of chalcedony overlaying the dark fire area. Fire agates aren't much to look at in the rough and are passed by, but when ground and polished properly, it exhibits sparkling red and green fire.

Trim the sides and bottom, cutting the matrix with a trim saw. Carefully, start grinding on the sides to the shape you want it. Use 120 grit. Be careful not to overheat the stone. Mount the stone on a dop

the stone close to the fire layer. Wet sanding can be used successfully, starting on 220 grit paper and finishing on 320 grit. Be sure not to overheat. Cerium oxide mixed with water to a thick paste and applied to a felt wheel for polishing, will give you the best results.

watch for fire.

Four important points to remember are: Choosing the area of the stone with the chalcedony overlaying the limonite area, grinding carefully, not grinding into the limonite area and not overheating the stone.

Soldering Prongs

I often use prongs to hold an irregular cab or other object on rings and pendants. But they're a little tricky to solder. You have to find some way to hold them upright while soldering, and what looks like a strong joint sometimes turns out to be a fake. There's nothing worse than having a prong break off when you're setting the stone, *#~*!

I solved both problems with one little trick. Locate and centerpunch the location for each prong. Then drill holes just a little smaller than your prong wire. Sand a small taper on the ends of your prong wires and insert them in the holes. The wires support themselves, soldering is easy, and the joint is stronger because of the increased soldering area.

Twisting Wire

Twisting wires together can be done with an old hand drill but goes much faster with a power tool. My preference is to use a screw gun, although a Dremel or Foredom should do well. Just make a little hook out of coat

hanger wire (or use a screw-in cup hook) and chuck it up in your screw gun. Fasten the ends of the wires in a vice and slip the other ends on your hook. Keep a little tension on the wires as you twist. Note that a power drill is too fast a tool for this unless you have one with a variable speed control.

Smoothing Earwires

Any time you make your own earwires, the hardest part for me is to sand and polish the end that's inserted into the ear. Any sharp edge there is not fun. I've tried using



sanding sticks, cup burs, and silicone polishing wheels. I've tried buffing on a Zam wheel, and I've tried spinning the wire in the Foredom to polish the tip. While all of these techniques do the job, none are very easy or fast.

Then it occurred to me - I could melt the wire smooth. One quick touch in the flame of the propane/oxygen Little Torch does the trick - not enough to form a bead on the wire but just enough to round off the tip.




